#### **CAMP TAHOSA SERVICE AWARD**

The Camp Tahosa Service Award is a joint project of Tahosa Lodge 383, Order of the Arrow, and the Tahosa. Alumni Association. By supporting service to Camp Tahosa, the Association and Lodge are acting

in direct support of the BSA mission to deliver program, in camp.

The award is a four segment patch, a 3" diameter Tahosa Gateway patch surrounded by three rockers. It takes 8 hours of service to earn each segment. Qualifying service to Camp will be determined by the Camp Ranger. The award may be earned by both Association and Lodge members.

The awards earned during the year will be presented at the respective organizations annual banquet.

## Bruce's Lure President's Message



Greetings Fellow Tahosa Alumni Members-

The winter programs have concluded and all eyes are looking to the summer camps and programs at Camp Tahosa. Preparations are being made for yet another great summer of good times and memories. If you haven't been up to camp for a while, I urge you to do so. The past improvements are really too numerous to mention here, but we are looking forward to some of the Tahosa Alumni Association sponsored projects this year, to include the refinishing of all three Lodges, adding yet another retaining wall the length of the north side of the road in front of the Welcome Center and Trading post and last but not least, the stocking of Rainbow Trout in Tumblesom Lake.

Due to the issue of loosing much of our fabulous Brook Trout population the spring after the reconstruction of the dam gate, the Tahosa Alumni Association has pledged to add a population of Rainbow Trout, in order to enhance and revitalize our fishing experience at camp. Without divulging numbers, we plan on stocking the lake during the TAA/OA Service Weekend/ Cony Party on May 21st. A time of delivery has not been confirmed as of yet, but if anyone has an interest in coming up to see our healthy batch of new residents, please feel free to call me at my home or my cell, the later of which is (303) 981-1243. My home number is listed with the other officers in this newsletter. The plan is to introduce the Rainbow Trout this spring, to allow them the chance to acclimate and grow, prior to the Brook Trout spawning which occurs in the fall. We currently have a Catch-n-Release policy on the lake and I anticipate this policy being in place through the remainder of this year. There will be a time period after the stocking of the Rainbows where the lake will be closed to fishing, as hatchery fish are used to being fed by pellets, therefore, can be caught and harvested easily. The new policies will be well published and I anticipate some other restrictions through the summer, but with a little help from Mother Nature, some good scouting

stewardship, I am hopeful this fall will begin the comeback of a healthy population of trout to be caught, released and enjoyed and for the first time in many years, we will have two kinds of trout to enjoy. We have been fortunate enough to have already funded, and more, this stocking, so the plan will be for another stocking of trout, (particular strain to be announced) next spring.

For those of you who haven't obtained a copy of John Meeker's new book "Camp Tahosa – A History Unfolding" you are missing a treat! Not only the history of Camp Tahosa but of all camps that preceded it. The book will be made available at scouting functions and is also available by sending a check for \$25 to the TAA Post Office Box. Included with the book, is a CD of the original "Dwellers of the Mountain Tops", shipping is also included. This book has caught the attention and is currently being reviewed by local authors.

Lastly, the Board of Directors of the Tahosa Alumni Association are consistently looking for ways to be more efficient and cost-effective in our business in an attempt to strive to put the most of our monies into Camp Tahosa. As of late, we have restructured our meeting schedule, to reduce the number of general Board Meetings and recently, changed the format of the production and delivery of our Tahosa Totem, which comprises the largest single annual expense. Our goal is to be fiscally responsible while continuing to provide service to Camp Tahosa and inform our Association membership of the latest news and events, so please, stay tuned for further changes in the near future.

Have a great summer and I look forward to seeing you at our Annual Picnic at Camp Tahosa on June  $11^{\rm th}$ .

The Museum committee puts on a different display in the lobby display case at the Denver Area Council headquarters every 3 months. The current display has memorabilia from the early Explorer programs and features some rare uniforms and literature from the Air Explorer and Sea Scouts programs as well as the "old" Explorer program associated mostly with the 1950's and "60's. Sea Scouts, which began in England, came immediately to the BSA in 1912 and still functions as a separate program. Air Scouts (or Explorers) came into being as a result of World War II, was dropped in 1965 and became one of several career specialty areas of Exploring.

### Say "Thank You!"

#### A true story submitted by Brian Payne

A few years ago I was invited back to the scout camp I attended as a youth. Camp Parsons, Chief Seattle Council. They were celebrating their 90th anniversary of continuous operation. Camp Parsons is one of a handful of scout camps that have operated continuously over 90 years through two World Wars.

It was quite the occasion. Scouts who attended camp became mayors, governors, congressmen and senators. All walks of life were present representing every decade from the 1920's. When I was a Scout we were allowed one shower a week and had to cut the wood in order to start the fire for hot water. And the 90 year old dining hall was to be finally rebuilt. I asked a couple of the folks at lunch when my old troop 160 would be in camp that summer. Troop 160 when I was a scout was one of the larger troops in the council. Over 60 active members.

They looked at me and said, "Oh Scotty was your scoutmaster." I said yes, indeed. Raymond Scott. Scotty had passed on some years before I was told. And the troop disbanded. I asked how could such a troop just go away? Scotty was the cornerstone, the glue that held the unit intact. And now he was gone as well as the troop. So when you have a chance say thank you to your scoutmaster. He just may be the last memory of your scouting years.

Brian reminds us that this can apply to several situations in scouting, so don't miss any of those opportunities, you don't want to end up regretting having missed the opportunity!
